Dear Permanent Representative,

The use of auctioning as an allocation method in the EU greenhouse gas emissions trading scheme is an option currently under discussion in the EU policy debate, on which the Environment Council will have to take a position.

UNICE is very concerned about the uncertain upfront tax represented by any auctioning mechanism, and about the dangers of bureaucracy that such a system entails.

In this context, UNICE firmly supports the joint statement by CEFIC, CEMBUREAU, CEPI, EURELECTRIC, EUROFER, EUROMETAUX and EUROPIA (attached) urging that allocation of allowances to be free of charge and that it should under no circumstances include auctioning.

I thank you for the consideration you may give to the analysis of the problem set out in the attached statement.

I would be very grateful if you could arrange for it to be circulated to your authorities and to the experts in charge of this dossier, with a view to the Environment Council on 17 October and subsequent work.

## Recommendation on the allocation method in the EU Greenhouse gas emissions trading scheme

CEFIC, CEMBUREAU, CEPI, EURELECTRIC, EUROFER, EUROMETAUX and EUROPIA believe that full clarity on the allocation mechanism should be provided urgently in order to minimise the adverse effects on the industry's competitive position, secure the internal market, reward early movers and create space for new entrants. Therefore:

- Allocation of allowances should be free of charge in both periods and should under no circumstance include auctioning. There appears to be a misconception that auctioning represents the only simple and fair method to allocate allowances, nevertheless....
- Auctioning is extremely costly to many sectors, thus seriously affecting the industry's ability to compete internationally and diverting substantial funds better spent on emission reducing investments. As an example, the cost of a 100% auctioning allocation would be close to Euro 20 billion per annum for the combined electricity and refining sectors, based on Euro 20 per ton of CO<sub>2</sub>.
- Proposed re-allocation systems are not clear, inevitably biased and probably very bureaucratic. They do not guarantee any more clarity, simplicity or fairness in the allocation process, and will introduce distortions of competition.
- Other systems already exist e.g.
  - ✓ grandfathering with an early base year for which the data are available and verifiable among several sectors.
  - ✓ benchmarking giving preferential treatment to those industry players who can demonstrate above par performance.
  - ✓ combination of environmentally friendly criteria.
- Space for new entrants can be created by allocating a small percentage of allowances to contenders following benchmarking or environmentally friendly allocation criteria.

We are ready now to help define transparent, objective and fair rules under Annex III within which Member States, should allocate allowances, consistently with the Internal Market principles and State aid rules.
