# Industrial Policy as a tool to face the challenges of the global market

More than ever European industry's competitiveness is put to the test by globalisation. The EU industry has the capacity to succeed if competition is fair and if obstacles to free trade are properly tackled. Progress in three particular domains is essential in this respect:

- → Access to raw materials at fair conditions how to shape a global strategy whereby access to raw materials becomes an effective policy priority at all possible levels of action;
- → Protection of intellectual property- how to conceive a global approach that provides effective protection to enterprises and addresses the criminal offences arising from counterfeiting and piracy;
- → International regulatory convergence how to foster mutual acceptance and convergence of those legislation bi- and multilaterally which have a direct impact on business operation.
