## Industry has actively supported the 'recast'

- Strong support from the very beginning of the process
- Regular participation in all events
- Several position papers
- → Business has highlighted the considerable changes in the export control environment, calling for innovative solutions

# Industry is disappointed by the limited results

- A very long process for small output
- Only several minor points have progressed
  - Brokering, transit and transhipment definitions
  - Proposals for Community General Export Authorisations
- → It seems that National Administrations are stuck in outdated but perhaps 'comfortable' regulations and procedures





## Trade is becoming very complex

- A new global geopolitical environment with new strategic concepts: more control on end-users and / or end-uses
- Major technological revolution
- More and more sophisticated trade patterns (internationalisation of operations, industrial cooperation, etc.)

# **Export Control remains of paramount importance**

- For the security of democratic countries ... as well as for responsible corporations
- Strict commitment to develop a 'level playing field'
- → An absolute necessity to develop efficient regulations and procedures which do not hamper legitimate trade





### Effective progress is possible

- The new Directive on 'Intra-Community Transfer of related Defence goods' shows that progress is achievable
- Despite more sensitive issues, innovative approaches have been established
  - Based on increased trust between countries
  - Based on confidence in business: certified companies + art. 10

# Effective progress is necessary

- To reduce legal uncertainty: catch-all clause, absence of information on sensitive end users, etc.
- To reduce delay: maximum time for delivering a licence
- To avoid redundant control: Annex 4 should be suppressed.
   Also control within a trans-European company or between Authorized Economic Operators





# **Proposals from business:**

- To finally open a high level forum to explore the challenges of export control on dual use items
- To improve awareness of all concerned economic actors
- To develop systemic approaches to control: trade issues are globalized (security, IPR, ethics, etc;)
- To address US extraterritorial policy
- To support the concept of Certified Companies and Authorized Economic Operators
- To promote a system less based on rules but more on responsible company behaviour
