BUSINESSEUROPE – US CHAMBER JOINT EVENT NEED TO INCREASE INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION ON COMPETITION POLICY

The US Chamber of Commerce and BUSINESSEUROPE today held a joint conference to discuss topical issues in competition policy with speakers from the EU and US institutions, business representatives and legal practitioners:

- Both organisations reiterated their firm belief that private legal actions seeking collective damages in antitrust cases will only increase dangers of abusive litigation in Europe with little benefit for victims. BUSINESSEUROPE urges the upcoming Commission to further reflect on this dossier.
- Fair procedures are essential if the credibility of enforcement decisions is not to be undermined, not only in Europe and the US but also in many other countries around the world.

BUSINESSEUROPE Director General Philippe de Buck said: "We urge antitrust authorities to further deepen their international cooperation on competition policy and enforcement, to ensure a coherent approach to markets regulation worldwide." The US Chamber Institute for Legal Reform President Lisa Rickard added: "We recommend European policymakers seek to avoid importing a U.S. style system which would encourage abusive litigation with limited benefit to consumers."
